#### **Dear Humboldtians and Friends.**

US alumni are critical to the mission and vision of American Friends of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation. Until now, however, the Alumni Council, Board of Directors, and staff of American Friends have had limited information about US alumni needs, interests, and expectations.

That is why American Friends earlier this year launched two major initiatives to reach out to US Humboldtians.

In early spring, the American Friends staff asked over 5,000 US Humboldtians to review their contact information. With the help of US alumni, we have updated over 50% of alumni records in our data base—information that has been shared with the Humboldt Foundation.

In April/May we sent a random sample of over 2,000 US alumni a short online survey exploring Humboldtians' connections to Germany, the AvH and American Friends, and their preferences regarding alumni activities and support. By mid-June, over 50% of survey recipients had responded to the AF survey.

In the coming weeks, we will be making the full results of the survey available to all US Humboldtians. In the meantime, you will find a sneak preview of several key findings in this addition of *Strata*.

We are excited about the survey results, which, for the first time, provide the Alumni Council, Board and staff with valuable data about US Humboldtians' preferences and thoughts. We are reviewing the information carefully, so that we can effectively integrate Humboldtians' input into our plans and programs.

I would like to express our hearty thanks to US Humboldtians for supporting our efforts to obtain current contact information and learn about alumni views and perspectives. Thank you for helping us understand how we can better serve US alumni and the Humboldt Foundation in support of our mission.

# Research in Germany Collaborations at the 2012 American Chemical Society Meeting Feature AvH President Schwarz and Humboldtian Professor Arduengo

The "Research in Germany (RiG)" partners were present in full force at the American Chemical Society (ACS) meeting in Philadelphia, PA in August. Representatives from the American Friends of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation (AFAvH), German Research Foundation (DFG), German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD), German Center for Research and Innovation in NY (GCRI NY), and Germany Trade and Invest (GTAI) coordinated closely to provide a comprehensive overview of the German research landscape and the diversity of funding opportunities in Germany for chemical scientists. This RiG presence included a booth in the exhibit hall and an informational luncheon.

ACS members and attendees stopped by the RiG booth to receive materials and one-on-one counseling about programs to support potential research stays in Germany. Attendees were particularly enthuasiastic about a new 2012 publication tailored to the needs of chemical scientists entitled Research Landscapes in Germany—Chemistry. This publication provides a detailed overview of the university and non-university research institutes in Germany that are active in the fields of chemistry. The Research in Germany partners also organized an informational luncheon featuring international chemists in industry and academia who have spent time doing research in Germany. **Professor Helmut Schwarz**,

President of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation, kicked off the event as the featured guest speaker. Professor Schwarz welcomed attendees and emphasized to the audience that "the Humboldt Foundation funds individuals like you." **Anthony Arudengo III** (USS, 1996), the Saxon Professor of Chemistry at the University of Alabama and adjunct Professor at the Institute for Inorganic Chemistry of Braunschweig University of Technology in Germany, spoke enthusiastically about his work in industry and academia,

## Donor Feature: Professor Dr. William M. Calder III: Sustaining German-American Exchange in the Classics

American Friends would like to express its deep gratitude to **Professor Dr. William M. Calder III** (GWI, 1996–1997) for his generous support of American Friends and of young scholars in the Classics. Professor Calder is a recipient of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation's Research Award in the Humanities.

**About Professor Calder:** Professor Calder is William Abbott Oldfather Professor of Classics at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He received a Humboldt Research Award in 1996–1997 in recognition of his lifetime achievements and scholarly contributions in classical Greek studies. Professor Calder's scholarship focuses in particular on the tragedies of classical antiquity and the modern history of classical philology.

William M. Calder III is probably the most widely known American classical scholar. This is surely true in Germany, the country whose scholarly traditions he has illuminated through carefully annotated letter and documents related to Wilamowitz, Mommsen, and their colleagues and successors

In 2008, scholars honored Professor William M. Calder III through a Festschrift, entitled In Pursuit of Wissenschaft (Hildesheim: George Olms Verlag AG, 2008). Scholarly contributors to the Festschrift included 35 friends and students, among them editors Dr. Robert Kirstein (FLF, 1998), Dr. Matthias Vorwerk (FLF, 2001), Dr. Stephan Heilen (FLF, 2000), Dr. Scott Smith, Professor Stephen M. Trzaskoma, and Dr. Rogier L. van der Wal. Subject matters embraced in the Festschrift include Wissenschaftsgeschichte, Greek tragedy, Greek philosophy, Greek and Roman literature, late Latin epistolography, textual criticism, art, history, Latin in the German education system, Roman history, ancient forgery, and Renaissance astrology. Capturing the international breadth and range of subjects of Professor Calder's work and career, Stephen M. Trzaskoma, University of New Hampshire, wrote:

At the Villa Mowitz in Urbana, in the Chandoleine in Vandoeuvres, in the cafes of Berlin . . . and in countless university seminar rooms, Bill has made a point of bringing his friends together in, to quote our title, pursuit of Wissenschaft

International connections: In 1968, Calder became the first American professor offered a visiting appointment at Rostock University, then part of the German Democratic Republic (GDR). He returned repeatedly over the next several decades. Calder has also had guest professorships at the University of Copenhagen, the University of the Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, South Africa, the American School of Classical Studies at Athens, and Boston University.

Professor Calder's scholarly activity has been broadly international. Since 1956 he has delivered over 350 lectures at universities, research institutions, academies, schools and congresses around the world.

**His donation:** Professor William M. Calder III celebrated his 70th birthday in September 2002 by making a gift to American Friends of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation

What his donation funds: The William M. Calder III Fellowship Program. Each year, the William M. Calder III Fellowship is awarded to a young,

highly qualified German Feodor Lynen Fellow or US Humboldt Research Fellow to pursue research related to classical antiquity or to its reception in medieval and modern times. Through his gift to American Friends, Professor Calder is ensuring that intellectual exchange in classical studies between Germany and the United States continues to thrive.

Seven prestigious *William M. Calder III Fellowships* have been awarded. For these fellows, Professor Calder's donations translated into additional financial support for their research as well as workshops and exchanges related to the fellow's project. Through his gift to American Friends, Professor Calder is ensuring that German-American exchange in classical studies remains strong and is sustained through future generations.

## Alumni Council Grant Supports Arctic Hysteria Networking Event

An evening of theatrical madness and German fare, sponsored by the Alumni Council of the American Friends of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation, drew together AvH alumni in San Francisco on August 2. Humboldtians were treated to a performance of Arctic Hysteria, the newest play by German Chancellor Fellow Abi Basch (BUKA, 2006-2007) and Kinderdeutsch Projekts, the German/American theater company comprised of colleagues from Basch's BUKA project in Hamburg. The play featured international artists from five different countries and was directed by Else Marie Laukvik from the world-renowned Odin Teatret in Denmark. Set in a kingdom of artificial snow and imagined eskimos, Arctic Hysteria follows an aging warlord as she attempts to pass on an unwanted kingdom to three ungrateful daughters, in the process descending into madness and taking the play with her. Following the performance, Humboldtians gathered at a reception at Club Monarch, where alumni were able to meet and speak with the artists and other alumni. A short presentation outlining the sponsorship opportunities of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation concluded the evening.

#### **Sneak Peek! US Alumni Survey Results**

To better understand the needs and interests of US alumni, American Friends conducted a brief survey of US Humboldtians in April/May of this year. We would first like to express our thanks to all those who participated in the survey. The responses will help the American Friends Alumni Council, Board and staff to plan the activities, events and other forms of support that best serve US alumni.

The complete survey results will be available in PDF form on the American Friends website in late 2012. American Friends would like to share an exciting preview of key survey findings:

- A majority of US Humboldtians maintain strong professional and personal ties to Germany. In the last five years, 42% had returned to Germany one to three times, and 40% had returned to Germany more than three times. Fifty percent of those traveling to Germany had done so for both professional and personal reasons, while 41% had visited for professional reasons and 9% for personal reasons. A strong majority (68%) maintain contact with German hosts sometimes, regularly, or often; even more Humboldtians (80%) maintain contact with friends and colleagues in Germany.
- Nearly three-quarters of Humboldtians (74%) feel personally connected to the AvH. Nearly 70% claim to be well informed about AvH activities, while 62% reported being well informed about American Friends activities.
- When it comes to alumni activities, US Humboldtians are most interested in events in their field of study (65%), in their region (52%), at their university (47%), or at professional and scientific meetings (36%).

- When it comes to alumni services, US Humboldtians remain interested in financial support to host visiting German researchers and scientists (62%) and to support their own research travel to Germany (60%). Nearly half (49%) would like to receive a list of Humboldtians engaged in their field, and more than a third (37%) would be interested in information on other Humboldtians at their institutions.
- US Humboldtians are eager to ensure that younger generations of scholars and scientists know about the opportunities provided by the AvH. Some 45% of US Humboldtians are interested in recruiting new Humboldtians, while over a third are willing to distribute promotional materials about the Foundation's sponsorship opportunities.
- Sizeable numbers of US Humboldtians are also interested in becoming more engaged in activities to strengthen the alumni community in the United States. Nearly a third (31%) of respondents are willing to attend a Kolleg, while 9% are prepared to organize one. A similar proportion would be prepared to organize an alumni meeting. Over a third (34%) expressed a willingness to serve as a Humboldtian on Campus. Nearly 27% of respondents declared a willingness to support American Friends with a charitable donation.

American Friends sent the short electronic questionnaire to a random sample of 2,043 US Humboldtians (~50%); by mid-June, 1,023 Humboldtians had completed the survey. Check your inboxes soon for a link to the full results!
